The Health of Beekeeping in Illinois

The bees are flying, flowers are blooming, the trees are sprouting new leaves and by the time you read this, I will have installed some new packages. Spring has arrived, and I'm excited. Most of my bees came through the winter well, so well, that I have a few strong colonies I can divide as soon as I get some queens. I hope your colonies are doing as well and that you are as enthused about beekeeping this year as I am.

In the news department, our ISBA ISBA Board has selected a new editor to edit and publish this ISBA Bulletin. He is Larry Krengel from the Northern Illinois Beekeepers Association (NIBA). A resident of Marengo, Illinois, Larry is a retired schoolteacher and a very active member of NIBA. He currently edits and

publishes "Sweet Stuff", the NIBA newsletter, and is now adding The Bulletin to his workload. Our best wishes to you, Larry, in your new endeavor.

Colonies per Beekeeper and the Average Number of Colonies per Apiary.

When you view the charts, you'll see that the number of registered beekeepers has been holding in the 1,100 to 1,200 range since year 2000; the number of registered apiaries is now fairly steady above 1,800; and the number of registered colonies has been showing a slight trend upward and is now just under 20,000. According to the last two charts named above, it appears that most of us are starting to keep more colonies (total between 16 and 17 per beekeeper) while increasing the size of our apiaries to an average of just under ten colonies.

Incidentally, Steve Chard is seeking an experienced beekeeper residing in one of Illinois' west central counties to become a bee inspector. The territory includes Rock Island, Mercer, Warren, Henderson, McDonough, Fulton, Schuyler, Adams, Brown, Pike and Calhoun counties. Contact Steve at 217 785-4233 or at schard@agr.state.il.us.

Finally, due to a delay in selecting an editor, followed by the transition in editor and print shops, there was a subsequent delay in this issue arriving in

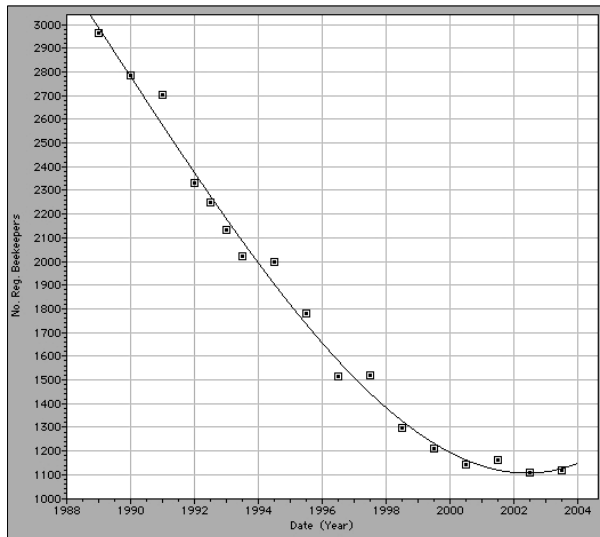

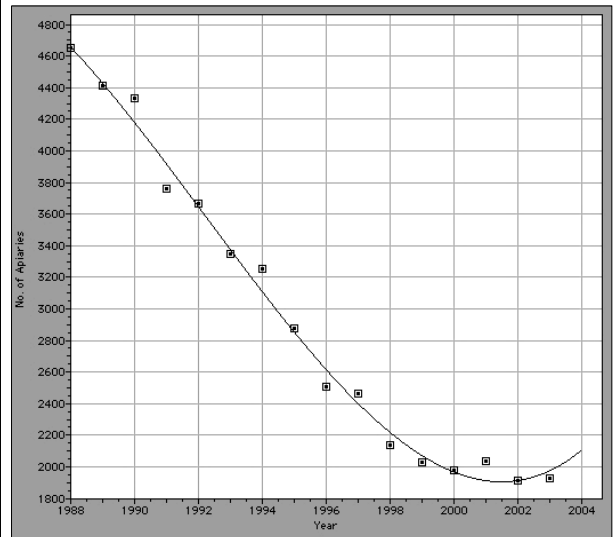
Obituary

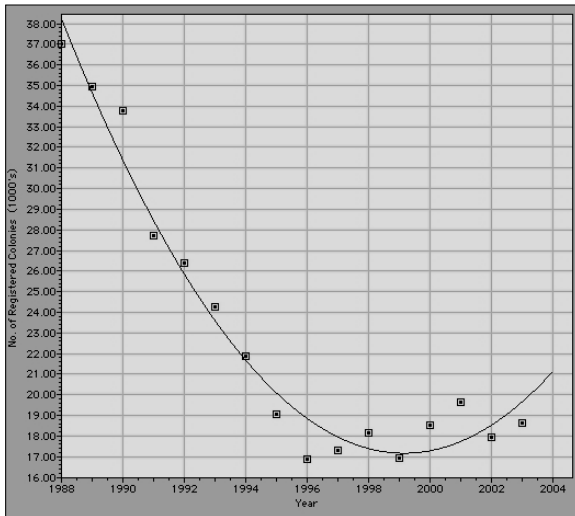
1. Number of Registered Beekeepers by Year



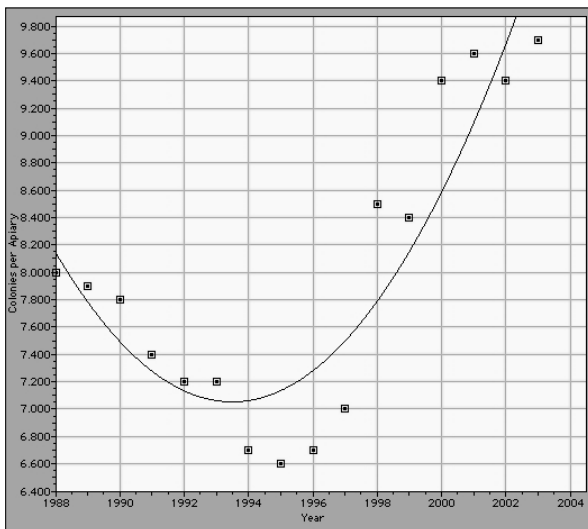
2. Number of Registered Apiaries by Year

Answers to the quick quiz -

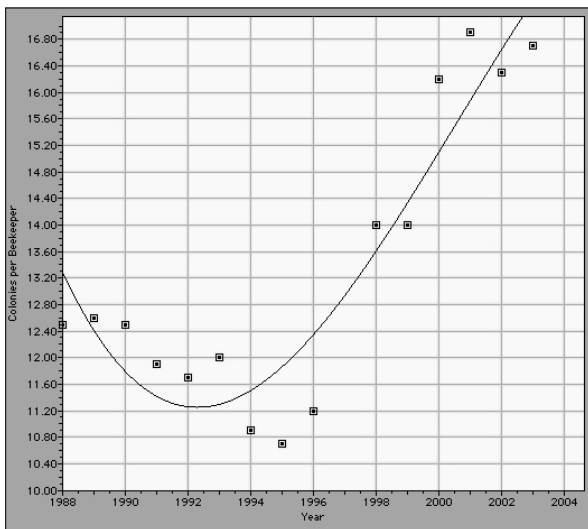
1. Just over 1100 beekeepers are registered in Illinois. That is an average of about 11 per county.
2. There were 2000 beekeepers ten years ago. Our ranks are down by nearly 50%
3. On average each beekeeper today keeps 56% more colonies than ten years ago.
4. The average beekeeper has about 16.8 colonies. That .8 likely has mites.
